TEMPLE CITY, CALIFORNIA
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
JULY 21, 2009**

1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Wong called the City Council Regular Meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers located at 5938 Kauffman Avenue, Temple City.

2. ROLL CALL

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Don Griffiths, former Planning Commissioner, led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

4. CEREMONIAL MATTERS – PRESENTATIONS

A. OATH OF OFFICE FOR NEW CITY COMMISSIONER

City Clerk Flandrick administered the Oath of Office to Peggy Miller, newly appointed Parks and Recreation Commissioner.

B. RECOGNITION OF FORMER PLANNING COMMISSIONERS

Mayor Wong and the City Council expressed appreciation to Don Griffiths and Jim LeBerthon for their years of service on the Planning Commission. Both were presented with a commemorative City tile.

5. PUBLIC COMMENTS ON ITEMS NOT LISTED ON THE AGENDA

Jerry Jambazian, Temple City businessman, read aloud a letter he had previously submitted to the Council expressing his concerns about the City and asking the Council to request Mayor Wong to step down as Mayor.

Dona Herrick, Temple City resident, said she was very perturbed about the City rejoining the Council of Governments (COG) and did not understand this decision as she felt it was a waste of City money.

Interim City Manager Burroughs responded that the Council did discuss this item during open session at subsequent meetings and the reasons for rejoining the COG were discussed at that time.

Carl Blum, Chairman of the 2007 Communications Task Force Committee, stated if the City is looking to become more proactive than reactive, the Council may wish to consider the Committee's written recommendations contained in a well thought out report sent to the Council two years ago. In addition, he recommended the Council: 1) assign a staff person to be responsible for communication with the public; 2) enhance the City website to include results from Council and Commission meetings by 10:00 a.m. the following day and weekly status updates of key issues; and 3) weekly e-mail blasts to those who want to receive them with brief updates of key City issues.

6. CONSIDERATION OF CITY COUNCIL REORGANIZATION

At the last Council meeting, it was requested that this item be placed on the agenda for consideration of Council reorganization. A majority vote was required for this item to proceed.

Chuck Souder, Temple City resident, said he was on a previous Council when they considered such an item. It is not pleasant, but he felt the Council needs to do what is best for the City. The resolution that all Councilmembers signed as to their conduct allows the action for this item and the Charter allows the Council to reorganize at any time.

Dina Piraino, Temple City resident, said she agreed with the previous speakers, stating the City needs to change for the good. She asked Council to consider the City and do this in the appropriate way.

Peggy Miller, Temple City resident, said she felt no one is above the law, but is entitled to a trial. You should not try to force someone who is not ready to act. They themselves know what they have done or not done. Allow them to make the decision.

Mayor Wong said she appreciated a lot of things stated in Mr. Jambazian's letter except for one thing she wished to correct. Mr. Jambazian does not know her, and even though she has been charged in an indictment, he says that she is out there passing out proclamations and all happy as though nothing has happened, but that is not true. He does not know how she really feels. She said she admired the courage of his personal opinion about what happened and that he is here as a citizen and cares about the city as she does. She stated that she did not do anything wrong and the truth will come out and she will be totally exonerated. She had no way to know how Council will vote and she did respect their decision. If voted to step down, there are lots of things she needs to do in order to be proven innocent, and once that is done, all those being mean to her will regret what they have done to her.

Councilmember Chavez stated he asked for this matter to be put on the agenda as his campaign was based on transparency and good ethics and working in the best interests of the City. A black cloud has arisen over the City over bribery and perjury charges and shortly before the election, the District Attorney investigation intensified over three Councilmembers. The results of the election clearly proved that a change was called for. Since then, one Councilmember resigned and two are charged with felony counts. These are only allegations; however, the charges relate directly to a breach of fiduciary duties by elected officials. This call for reorganization is not a determination of guilt or innocence; the courts will decide that. He applauded her decision to fight for her innocence. This does not have to do with one person, but what is in the best interest of the City. We are in the process of hiring a City Manager and this will be an impact. With the recent turmoil of the Piazza and resulting court action, the City needs to overcome the negativity. It is important in this instance to put aside personal bias and put the City first. Council perception plays a major role in how Temple City is portrayed.

Councilmember Vizcarra said he had probably been through more battles of anyone here with the previous Council and worked hard to assist any of those running for office in the last election. He was aware of the perception of Council as he heard it every day outside of here. He was involved with a group considered to be "rabble rousers", the TCNA, now considered an organization within the City. It was always a support group trying to bring some integrity, ethics and honesty and transparency to our government. Councilmember Chavez made a point he was aware of for many years – that perception is reality. Behind the scenes, he tried to ameliorate the situation trying to find a solution less unpleasant, but that did not happen. We are at the point where a hard decision has to be made and he was prepared to make it. The general opinion is that what is going on is not a good thing. Another element to be aware of is all Council gets painted with the same brush whether involved or not. We have to take a stand at this point.

Councilmember Yu said he had hoped this issue would have resolved itself without having to come to a vote tonight. As a Councilmember and elected representative here, he has to set aside his personal feeling and vote in the interests of the City what we have pledged and sworn

to. He respected Ms. Wong's decision to fight and he wished her well and prayed she will be proven innocent like all indicted. The legal challenges before the City are definitely a distraction from normal City business. The office of Mayor carries an important symbolic meaning representing the people as well as the Council. The Mayor is our face to the outside world. He felt it best that Councilmembers not involved in the Piazza and its legal challenges represent the City as Mayor. He urged everyone to remember that everyone is innocent until proven guilty. He said he had to set his personal feelings aside as he was in support of reorganization for the better good of the City. As legal challenges get resolved, Council can always call for another reorganization.

Councilmember Sternquist said she too found herself in a difficult situation having to separate what is best for the City and its residents from personal feelings. There was no doubt in her mind that Judy Wong is an enthusiastic and dedicated member of Council and tirelessly gives of her time attending events as representative of our City. She believed that an indictment of the Mayor has given residents the feeling that the City is not trustworthy. She echoed Councilmember Vizcarra's feelings that it is difficult to go out sometimes because people lump you in the same category. As Councilmember Chavez mentioned, the City is in the process of hiring a Manager and we need to attract new business to the City. There are a lot of local and state issues that our City is currently facing and we need to focus on those. She believed the Council cannot afford the distraction of a long legal battle and still move forward. She believed the selection of a new Mayor will help to do so.

- E. RESOLUTION NO. 09-4622 – ADOPTING THE SEWER SYSTEM MANAGEMENT PLAN (SSMP)
On May 2, 2006, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) adopted Statewide General Waste Discharge Requirements 9GWDR) for publicly owned sanitary sewer systems. The GWDR requires agencies that own or operate a sanitary sewer system comprised of one mile or more to develop and implement a Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP) that documents a comprehensive program for sewer system operation, maintenance and repair. Most of the programs required by the discharge requirements already exist within the City and are being provided by the Los Angeles County Sewer Maintenance District; however the Public Services Department is preparing the SSMP and modifying the existing programs in accordance with the new requirements. It was recommended that Council adopt Resolution No. 09-4622 approving the Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP).

John L. Hunter, of Hunter-Kennedy and Associates, stated he assisted the City with the report and provided background information on the Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP). The Council was asked to approve the SSMP which provides the legal authority

to operate and maintain the program as well as providing for emergency response and including design performance provisions and monitoring clause. The Plan will be presented every two years for review.

A. SECOND READING AND ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE NO. 09-928 AMENDING SECTION 3569 OF THE TEMPLE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBITING SMOKING IN CITY PARKS

Interim City Manager Burroughs presented Ordinance No. 09-928 for second reading and adoption. The ordinance would prohibit smoking in City parks by adding "smoking of lighted tobacco products" to the list of behaviors not allowed within a park or civic center. It was recommended that Council request reading of the title of the ordinance, waive further reading and adopt the ordinance.

At the request of Council, City Clerk Flandrick read the title of Ordinance No. 09-928.

Jerry Jambazian, Temple City businessman, asked for the definition of civic center.

Interim City Manager Burroughs stated civic center refers to this entire block, and parks refers to both parks and parking lots.

Phina Li, Temple City resident, asked Council that once the ordinance is approved, to place signs in the park area to let the public know that the City has an ordinance and everyone should follow the new policy.

Interim City Manager Burroughs noted that once adopted, the ordinance will take effect 30 days after today.

Councilmember Chavez moved to waive further reading and adopt Ordinance No. 09-928, an ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE CITY AMENDING SECTION 3569 OF THE TEMPLE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBITING SMOKING IN CITY PARKS, seconded by Councilmember Sternquist and unanimously carried by the following roll call vote:

B. CONSIDERATION OF INSTALLING A MULTI-WAY STOP SIGN AT THE INTERSECTION OF EL MONTE AVENUE AND DAINES DRIVE

Interim City Manager Burroughs stated on June 2, 2009, the City Council directed staff to look at the possibility of installing stop signs on El Monte Avenue and approved a traffic engineering speed survey including traffic counts at the intersection of El Monte Avenue and Daines Drive.

The directed enforcement period began on June 3, 2009 and concluded on July 3, 2009. During this period the Sheriff's Department issued 71 citations, a breakdown of which was provided in the staff report. The traffic engineering speed survey, including traffic counts was conducted on June 16, 2009 and indicated:

- 1) The Average Daily Traffic (Traffic Counts) on El Monte Avenue was 8,316; and
- 2) The 85th Percentile Speed was 41.75 mph.

After conducting the traffic engineering survey, it has been determined that the intersection of El Monte Avenue and Daines Drive does not meet the warrants for the installation of a multi-way stop sign. Therefore, it is the recommendation of the traffic engineer and staff that the radar trailer be utilized on El Monte Avenue to warn approaching motorists of their speed and that the Sheriff's Department continue with enforcement.

Jane Chavez, Temple City resident, stated she travels El Monte Avenue every day and sees tickets being issued every day. She didn't understand the study that was presented as it does not present itself accurately to Council. There was an accident there where a life was almost lost and several residents have mentioned that the city is just waiting until a life is lost to do something. She urged Council to be proactive and not reactive.

Pat Lang, City Traffic Engineer, responded to questions from Council, stating, under a new law, the intent is to set the speed at which 85% of the drivers are driving. To get compliance with speed limits, it is necessary to employ education, engineering and enforcement. The majority of accidents happen where stop signs are not warranted. The previous law said the speed could be rounded down to the closest 5 mile increment, with the ability through a report to lower it down another 5 mph. Under the new law, you have to round up and it has to be documented that there is something the motorist may not be aware of, like a sight condition, curve, etc.

Mr. Lang suggested putting a radar trailer there about once a month indicating what the speed is and what each approaching motorist's speed is and then follow that up with enforcement.

Council discussed the item and Mayor Pro Tem Yu suggested perhaps re-aligning the street or environmentally changing the appearance to a narrower street to reduce speeds.

Patrick Horton, Temple City Planning Commissioner, stated he did not read the report or had seen the site, but suggested consulting with the neighboring cities of Arcadia and El Monte to figure out traffic calming methods utilized by other cities, such as flashing cross walks or speed humps.

Mayor Vizcarra recommended Mr. Horton present his suggestions to the Planning Commission to have some discussion at that level.

Mayor Pro Tem Yu moved to deny the request for the installation of a multi-way stop sign at the intersection of El Monte and Daines Drive, and directed staff to come back with a more comprehensive study in collaboration with the Planning Commission, seconded by Councilmember Sternquist and carried by the following roll call vote:

C. CODE ENFORCEMENT POLICY

At the July 7, 2009 City Council meeting, the City Council gave direction to staff to prepare a Code Enforcement policy, which allows staff to proactively initiate a case on both commercial and residential properties.

At the request of Interim City Manager Burroughs, Public Safety Officer Ariizumi presented his staff report, stating in September 2001, the City Council approved a six-step program for implementing more vigorous enforcement of the City's code. Four years ago the direction was changed to be less proactive and since then has been amended several times.

A part of code enforcement is about education and working with the public. Several years ago the City did have public outreach with property owners and he submitted the code enforcement brochure that was mailed out citywide to residents and businesses. Additionally, there was increased effort of top code violations. With the new program, staff proposed a policy that allows proactive enforcement as follows:

- 1) Code Enforcement Officers may proactively patrol their assigned code enforcement zones and will be reactive in responding to and investigating complaints from the public, including anonymous complaints.
- 2) Code Enforcement shall make a good faith effort to ensure homeowners and business persons are aware of the requirements of the City Code.
- 3) Code Enforcement shall attempt to gain voluntary compliance to abate code violations, by issuing verbal and written warnings, compliance notices and notice of violation letters. In the event voluntary compliance is unattainable, staff may schedule an office conference or issue administrative citations, and further to be referred to the City Prosecutor if needed.

Mary Burke, Temple City resident, was happy that now the code enforcement officers hands are not tied. She also noticed recent action on a house in her neighborhood.

Linda Payne, Chamber President and CEO, felt the brochure that was mentioned was really effective. The Chamber was involved in the business end of it and worked closely with code enforcement. It was an aggressive program and worked well and the Chamber would like to be part of it again.

Oscar Bustamante, Temple City business owner and Chamber member, stated he believed the Council can prioritize and talk about the bigger picture of having the City turned around with redevelopment, and put time and energy to that first, instead of a stop sign. Avant Garde is here tonight and he looked forward to seeing what they are doing to improve our business district and bringing businesses to Temple City.

Council expressed their support of the proactive plan and Public Services Officer Ariizumi responded to questions and asked for direction on how to proceed.

Councilmember Chavez moved to approve the proposed Code Enforcement Policy, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Yu and unanimously carried by the following roll call vote:

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi indicated the brochure would have to be amended to reflect the current policy and statutes and when completed would go out to bid. The City could begin with the commercial sector and then work on a flyer for the residential portion.

Council discussion continued regarding the noticing timeline.

Councilmember Sternquist amended her motion to move, with the help of the Chamber, to provide notice to businesses within a timeframe not to exceed 45 days in which to educate, distribute flyers and begin enforcement, seconded by Councilmember Chavez.

Jerry Jambazian, Temple City businessman, noted that the City's demographics have changed since the original brochure went out and asked if it would be available in multiple languages.

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi responded that the brochure would be produced in the three major languages spoken in Temple City.

Mary Kokayko, Temple City resident, thought that 45 days would be adequate notice and stated she still felt there was a need for a town hall meeting before any major decisions were made about the downtown area.
