REGULAR MEETING MINUTES  
JUNE 1, 2010**

**1. CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez called the City Council Regular Meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers located at 5938 Kauffman Avenue, Temple City.

**2. ROLL CALL**

Councilmember Blum moved to excuse Mayor Vizcarra for cause, seconded by Councilmember Yu and unanimously carried.

Councilmember Blum provided the Invocation.

**4. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Temple City businessman Jerry Jambazian led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**5. CEREMONIAL MATTERS – PRESENTATIONS**

**A. INTRODUCTION OF MISS TEMPLE CITY HONOR COURT**

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez thanked the Chamber of Commerce for putting on this great event every year. The accomplishments of all fourteen contestants at such a young age is a testament to all of them. He congratulated all three winners and said he was confident they would represent the City in a great way.

Chamber of Commerce President Linda Payne presented Miss Temple City and her Court for 2010-2011: Miss Temple City Heidi K. Chow; and Miss Temple City Honor Court members Terry Sun and Jennifer Der. Each introduced themselves and received a Certificate of Recognition from the City Council.

The City Council was requested to consider authorizing staff to apply for a National Trust for Historic Preservation (NTHP) grant. The maximum grant amount to be awarded is \$10,000 and the deadline to apply is June 15, 2010. At this time, staff has prepared a Resolution authorizing the City Manager to apply for this grant opportunity.

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez wished to emphasize this item as it is a rather historic event in itself in that Temple City has never had any type of historic preservation ordinance or any mechanism to move it forward. He felt it appropriate in this 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary year for the City to begin this process and be able to recognize those structures deemed historic.

**8. UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

A. CONSIDERATION OF EXPANSION OF DIAL-A-RIDE ELIGIBILITY TO INCLUDE QUALIFIED INDIVIDUALS LIVING WITHIN CERTAIN UNINCORPORATED COUNTY AREAS

Councilmember Sternquist stated a petition of persons desiring the City's Dial-A-Ride service was mailed to her home. She had expected the petition to be in the agenda packet, but did not realize that it had not been given to the City. She said she would provide the City Council with a copy of the petition.

Parks and Recreation Director Burroughs stated the Council is being asked to consider expanding the City's Dial-A-Ride service to include qualified non residents. On April 6,

Councilmember Sternquist asked the Council to consider expanding the service to residents of unincorporated county areas adjacent to Temple City. The Parks and Recreation Commission considered the item and discussed various issues including the possible number of county residents that might use the program, the distance the vehicles may have to travel, and the impact of those issues on existing Dial-A-Ride members. The Commission ultimately recommended that no changes be made to the program. The Council asked staff to look into other options.

Currently the Dial-A-Ride program is open only to Temple City residents 60 years and over or with a disability, living within the City limits. The service is provided within Temple City for any purpose and outside for specific purposes. Director Burroughs indicated the City boundaries and county areas on a map. The unincorporated county area east of Temple City is relatively small. The larger area west of the city is the area between Longden Avenue to the north and the railroad tracks to the south and includes many small pockets of the City of San Gabriel.

Four options were provided to Council for their consideration:

Option 1 would be for no change in the program. Residents of unincorporated areas would be referred to the appropriate agency. The City currently receives 1-2 such inquiries per month.

Option 2 would include residents of unincorporated county areas who would be allowed to schedule rides as residents currently do and would be unrestricted in locations they could visit.

Option 3 would include residents of unincorporated county areas, but would be restricted to allow rides into Temple City only. The area would include the county area east of Temple City and possibly a portion of the unincorporated county area west of the City as far north as Duarte Road.

Option 4 would include residents of unincorporated county areas, with or without restrictions, and an additional vehicle would be added to the fleet to accommodate these riders. The cost for the added vehicle to be used Monday through Friday between 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. would be approximately \$98,000 per year.

Staff and the service provider, Diversified Transportation, would monitor options 2-4 to determine the impact on service, including the number of requests that were not able to be accommodated, any increase in the amount of time for each trip and wait time for unscheduled rides.

Councilmember Sternquist said she has seldom seen a bus with more than five people at a time, and was curious as to what the ridership availability is and the actual count on average.

Michael Kline, representing Diversified Transportation, responded to questions from Council, said he could provide ridership counts per operation hours and stated the hours have been adjusted twice within the past month or two.

Councilmember Blum said he believed only two people came and spoke at the Commission meeting where this was discussed. As nice as it would be to offer this service, with recent talks of declining revenue, he did not think the City should be expanding at this point and would go with option one.

Mary Kokayko, Temple City resident, said she is a rider on Dial-A-Ride and the vehicles cannot be full because they go in different areas. She thought the service was great

because they go out of the City for residents and sometimes it takes a long time to get there. She did not think the Council should expand the service. If these people want to have our services, then they should join us. They don't live here and don't vote here. Council should look out for our residents.

Linda Payne, speaking as Chamber of Commerce President, said she has had numerous calls in the last several years from residents in the unincorporated areas that would like to have Dial-A-Ride service. Many said they vote in the City but live in the unincorporated area and do not get service.

Linda Payne, speaking as a business owner, said she has many customers that use the Dial-A-Ride service and are very happy with it. They do have to call way in advance to schedule a ride but are picked up on time and delivered on time. The drivers are incredible and she thought it was a great service and would like to see it include the unincorporated areas.

Councilmember Yu stated one of the things Council has to consider is the cost benefit, which amounts to about \$20 per ride. The funding is through Prop A for these transportation type programs. If people are coming into Temple City to shop and we are able to keep the program the same without loss of service, he would be in favor of option three. This would include the unincorporated areas to boost Temple City businesses, but keep a cap on the program costs and not add an additional vehicle.

Councilmember Sternquist felt strongly about providing service to people. Her intent was never to provide service to anyone who lived in surrounding areas, but to a particular group of people that didn't have this service from anywhere else. We could provide that service for them to come into Temple City to support our businesses. She suggested implementing this extended service on a trial basis to see what the impact is. She was in favor of option three with the distinction to provide service to the area where no other service is provided.

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez stated he didn't think this was a revenue issue as the program we have now is fully funded through Prop A. The question is do we want to expand and if so, in what area. Anything to encourage people to come into Temple City and spend money is a good thing. He did believe that we have certain time periods where there are delays and adding riders to that and going to other areas would put a burden on this program. We would need to monitor this to see where to go after 3-6 months. He would lean toward option three to include portions of the unincorporated areas especially 91780 zip code area and limit it to bringing them into Temple City. He would ask for a review after three months to look at the impacts to expand further or take back.

Director Burroughs confirmed the unincorporated areas in question would include not just the area to the east, but also from the City limits to San Gabriel Boulevard to the west, Duarte Road to the north and the rail road tracks to the south.

City Attorney Vail stated if Council finds benefit in this expansion after the trial period, it will require an amendment to the contract and asked if Diversified Transportation would be willing to expand the area without additional costs.

Mr. Kline, Diversified Transportation, confirmed the company would be willing to do this as a pilot program without additional costs.

Councilmember Sternquist moved to approve Option 3 to include residents of unincorporated County areas – with restrictions as indicated, for a trial period of three months, seconded by Councilmember Yu and carried by the following roll call vote:

**9. NEW BUSINESS**

**A. FIRST READING AND INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCE NO. 10-935 AMENDING SECTIONS 3320 – 3329 OF THE TEMPLE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO OVERNIGHT PARKING ON CITY STREETS**

The City Council was requested to consider adoption of Ordinance No. 10-935 which amends Sections 3320 – 3229 of the Temple City Municipal Code relating to overnight parking on City streets.

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi stated on February 16, staff provided the City Council with a report reviewing the overnight parking permit process for Temple City and surrounding cities. The City Council directed staff to incorporate the following items into the overnight parking permit program and process:

- A new annual permit fee, which is to be prorated with a minimum fee;
- A transfer and replacement permit fee;
- A senior discount rate for an annual overnight parking permit;
- A monthly overnight parking permit;
- Limit the number of annual permits per household to two permits;
- All vehicles must be currently registered to the applicant's residence; and
- A site inspection prior to the issuance of a permit will not be required by staff unless staff receives a complaint regarding the applicant's vehicle(s) and/or property.

Per Council's direction, staff prepared an amendment to the overnight parking ordinance. Also, at the February 16 meeting, the City Council approved an agreement with Revenue & Costs Specialist (RCS) to prepare a cost allocation plan and comprehensive user fee study which should be completed in August 2010. Staff will use this information to determine acceptable permit fees for the overnight parking permit to be set by adoption of a resolution.

After consulting with the City Attorney, staff has recommended two options for Council's consideration:

Option 1 – proceed with a public hearing to adopt the ordinance and a temporary user fee structure to be used for the remainder of the 2010 permit period ending on December 31, 2010; or

Option 2 – postpone the public hearing and adoption of the ordinance until the final user fee study is completed in August 2010.

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi provided timelines for both options. Additional changes to the code include naming the appellate board as the Public Safety Commission and inspections at the initial application may be conducted if warranted by the issuing officer.

City Attorney Vail stated staff took the approach of what should go in the ordinance and resolution to provide flexibility to the Council. Any discount or fee provision or number of permits issued to a residence are all appropriate to put into the resolution to be updated every two years. The temporary fee structure would stay in place until the end of the year. Regarding the inspections, the issuing officer would have the authority to perform

an inspection when warranted. A conditional permit would be issued with a time limit when an inspection is to take place.

Council discussed the ordinance amendment with staff responding to questions as needed.

Councilmember Blum moved to approve Option 1, to proceed with the public hearing and adopt the ordinance and temporary fee structure for the remainder of 2010, seconded by Councilmember Yu and unanimously carried by the following roll call vote:

B. FIRST READING AND INTRODUCTION OF PROPOSED ORDINANCE NO. 10-934 AMENDING SECTIONS 2683 AND 2687(A-B) OF THE TEMPLE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE

The City Council was requested to consider the: 1) reinstatement of the Public Safety Commission; and 2) adoption of Ordinance No. 10-934 which amends Sections 2683 and 2687 (A-B) of the Temple City Municipal Code, amending the duties of the Public Safety Commission.

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi stated on July 6, 1994, the City Council adopted an ordinance creating the Public Safety Commission for the City of Temple City. In October 1997, the Commission held their last agendized meeting, and although never formally disbanded, has remained dormant since that time.

On May 18, 2010, staff discussed the reinstatement of the Public Safety Commission and a proposal to amend the duties of the Commission. It was felt that this Commission would be the appropriate body to assist the City Council in reviewing and addressing various public and traffic safety concerns of the community. The current duties of the Commission could be amended to allow the Commission to review requests for hearings for parking and administrative citations and could also be the appellate body for appeals stemming from the denial or revocation of an overnight parking permit.

The Public Safety Commission would also be instrumental in assisting with the development, review and implementation of the upcoming Citywide Traffic Calming Study and Master Plan and the comprehensive Downtown Parking Study for recommendation to the City Council. The duties would also include the development and implementation

of emergency services programs as all Commissioners are considered part of the Temple City Emergency Operations Team.

Staff responded to Council's questions as needed. As with other Commissions, the Public Safety Commission would be made up of five members and would be considered a volunteer position appointed by the City Council.

Mary Burke, Temple City resident, felt that parking has been a problem for some time now, not only in the business section, but also in the residential areas. The issuing of tickets could be improved and the parking signs should be larger and more available.

Jerry Jambazian, Temple City businessman, asked if other similar commissions would be combined with this one.

Public Safety Officer Ariizumi responded that the both the Traffic and Safety Commissions were disbanded when the Public Safety Commission was created.

Council discussion continued.

City Attorney Vail clarified that the action requested of Council was to amend the ordinance to revise the powers of the Public Safety Commission. Training, if needed could be provided by his firm. Council could select the members of the Commission as it does other Commissions. It was recommended to use a body other than the City Clerk or outside hearing officer as the appellate body. By introduction and adoption of the proposed ordinance, Council would be amending the code, not initiating or filling positions.

At the request of Council, City Clerk Flandrick read the title of Ordinance No. 10-934.

Councilmember Blum moved to waive further reading and introduce Ordinance No. 10-934, an ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE CITY, CALIFORNIA, REVISING THE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION DUTIES OF ARTICLE E OF CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 2 OF THE TEMPLE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE, seconded by Councilmember Sternquist and unanimously carried by the following roll call vote:

**15. COUNCIL REPORTS REGARDING AD HOC OR COMMISSION MEETINGS**

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez reported that he and staff members met with the School District representatives primarily to discuss the Joint Use Agreement. The Committee's recommendation to the Council will be to renew the agreement with the same terms as last year in the amount of \$20,000. The School District was in agreement and the Agreement will be presented to Council for final approval. Also the Committee discussed some joint use projects, one of which was the Safe Routes to School Program.

City Manager Pulido provided information on the Safe Routes to School Program to get kids safely to and from school including amenities that make walking more comfortable. The City is working with the District on a grant application for this program which is due June 15 and will come to the Council at a future meeting for authority to apply.

**16. COUNCIL ITEMS SEPARATE FROM THE CITY MANAGER'S REGULAR AGENDA**

**A. COUNCILMEMBER BLUM**

Councilmember Blum inquired when the Council would meet again to prioritize the goals discussed at their recent goals session.

City Manager Pulido stated staff would poll the City Council to schedule a date for prioritizing goals prior to the special budget session.

**B. COUNCILMEMBER STERNQUIST**

Councilmember Sternquist asked when the Dial-A-Ride service would begin for those in the unincorporated areas.

Parks and Recreation Director Burroughs stated she anticipated the service would be available by July 1.

**C. COUNCILMEMBER YU**

Councilmember Yu stated last month the City Council held both a strategic planning/goals session and a special budget study session, and there is a lot of information in the meeting minutes as these meetings were not televised. Due to the economy, the General Fund has been decreasing for the past three fiscal years by \$2M, which is why the Council is looking so carefully at the budget. Between now and the adoption of the budget the Council ad hoc committee will look at a lot of things as well as starting some strategic planning as there is much to be done. The City will be finalizing a budget in the next few weeks that reflects the lowering of revenues and putting Council's new goals in place.

D. MAYOR PRO TEM CHAVEZ

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez thanked Parks and Recreation Director Burroughs and her staff for all their time and dedication involved with the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary events, including the dinner and event at the park. They were great first class events and everyone felt proud to be a part of them.

Creation of a City Council Ad Hoc Committee to Discuss and Develop City Council and Commission Protocols

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez suggested an ad hoc committee be formed to discuss and develop protocols as a means to establish a certain standard of conduct for city officials. The purpose would be to ensure openness and fairness and how best to make ethical decisions and be accountable for those decisions in regard to others. There is currently nothing comparable in our codes that addresses those types of issues. This would not be limited to Council, but Commissions as well as all those making decisions need to hold ourselves accountable and protect the integrity of the City. The committee could work with the City Manager and City Attorney to prepare the document.

Councilmember Blum felt this was an excellent recommendation and would be willing to serve on the committee.

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez said he too would like to be involved and relayed that Mayor Vizcarra said he would defer to any other Councilmember who wished to serve on the committee.

Councilmember Yu stated, at the strategic planning session, this was mentioned as the most urgent thing the Council needed to do if it wishes to be a high performance City Council and staff.

Councilmember Sternquist thought it was a good idea as anyone who sits on Council has to hold themselves to a certain standard. When she took the Oath of Office she took it to heart and each time she comes to these meetings, she keeps it in mind. She was not so sure an ad hoc committee was needed for this purpose, but by putting it to paper the residents would be aware of it.

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez appointed Councilmember Blum and himself as the initial ad hoc members of this committee to discuss and develop protocols.

Mayor Pro Tem Chavez said a letter was received from a concerned citizen who wanted to see changes in the places to shop in town. He stated to whomever wrote the letter that those suggestions are welcome as the Council does listen and does respond. But he asked if anyone does write a letter to not be anonymous as a name gives credence to the letter and will allow a response.

18. **ADDITIONAL PUBLIC COMMENTS ON ITEMS NOT LISTED ON THE AGENDA**

Mary Burke, Temple City resident, said the weekly Manager's Report has good information for the residents. She noticed that the timing on traffic signals has changed tremendously. A few years

ago it was said that all of the signals would be adjusted to coincide and get cars through quicker, and she wondered if that had changed. She felt the City has high performance as far as the Council and staff are concerned and had nothing but praise for everyone who works at the City. She suggested when ordinances are discussed, it would be helpful to have handouts for those in the audience so they can follow what is being discussed.

Councilmember Blum suggested they could possibly be displayed on screen, and Councilmember Yu noted that there are binders in the back of the Chambers with copies of full agenda backup information.

Jerry Jambazian, Temple City businessman, sent kudos out to the Council and anyone who had anything to do with last weekend's anniversary events. He saw faces from many years ago and everyone had a good time reminiscing. The venue was great and the park looked like a showcase. It took over a year of planning, but it went off without a hitch.
