- April 5, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACoDPH) made changes to the Travel Advisory:
 - All individuals should continue to avoid non-essential travel.
 - Fully vaccinated persons are at lower risk and may travel taking public health precautions:
 - If asymptomatic, no quarantine or testing is needed upon return.
 - All non-essential travelers who are not fully vaccinated must:
 - Quarantine for 7 full days after travel if they get tested and get a negative COVID-19 viral test result from a specimen collected 3-5 days after their arrival.
 - Quarantine for 10 full days after travel if they did not get tested with a COVID-19 viral test after their arrival.
 - All travelers must:
 - Self-monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days, and avoid being around people who are at increased risk for severe illness.
 - Isolate and should get tested if symptoms develop.
- April 2, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19 Order, which is effective at 12:01 a.m. on April 5, 2021 and includes the following modifications:

*Total number of resident cases and deaths in Temple City are inclusive of cases and deaths in SNFs.

- **Breweries, Wineries, Distilleries that do not serve meals** can remain open outdoors and can also open indoors at 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is fewer. These establishments will follow the same public health directives as bars for their outdoor areas, however, there are additional requirements for indoor spaces: reservations are required for indoor seating, there is a maximum of 6 people per table and they must be from the same household, and there is no live entertainment or television viewing indoors;
- **Restaurants** can increase capacity for indoor dining to 50% capacity or 200 people, whichever is less with continued safety modifications;
- **Cardrooms** can operate indoors at 25% capacity. There must be 8-feet of distancing between tables and masks are always required. Food and beverages remain banned from card tables;
- **Places of Worship** can hold services indoors at 50% capacity;
- **Fitness Centers** can operate indoors at 25% capacity and indoor pools can now re-open. Masks are always required unless swimming;
- **Movie Theatres** can increase capacity to 50% or 200 people, whichever is less. Seats must be reserved, and each group must have 6 feet of distance from other groups in all directions. Eating is allowed in only designated areas or in your reserved seat;
- **Family Entertainment Centers** can open indoors at 25% capacity for distanced activities, such as bowling or escape rooms. Masks remain required;
- **Grocery and Retail Stores** can increase capacity to 75%, although Public Health strongly recommends grocery stores remain at 50% capacity until April 15 to allow as many grocery store workers as possible get vaccinated;
- **Hair Salons, Barbershops and Personal Care Services** can increase capacity to 75% with masks required, except for services where customers need to remove their masks. For services where customers must remove their face coverings, staff must wear a fitted N95 and goggles or a mask with a face shield;
- **Museums, Zoos and Aquariums** can be open indoors at 50% capacity; and
- **Youth and Adult Recreational Sports** can apply to Public Health for approval for athletic events, tournaments or competitions that involve more than two teams or multiple individuals.
- All City employees are on paid administrative leave until May 31, 2021, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- All city employees are directed to work from home until further notice.
 - Office Staff – May report to work if necessary, with approval of their supervisor, and per the staggered work schedule.
 - Field Staff – Reporting to work on their regular work days, but leaving as soon as essential / emergency work is completed
- The City Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is remotely activated at Level 3 (lowest level).
- Overnight parking enforcement is suspended until further notice.
- Senior Meal Program - Meals are being delivered by Parks & Recreation staff every Tuesday. Each senior receives 7 meals for the week.
 - April 6, 2021 – 735 meals delivered to 105 seniors.

PROCLAMATIONS AND EXECUTIVE ORDERS:

- April 5, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACoDPH) made changes to the Travel Advisory: **All individuals should continue to avoid non-essential travel; Fully vaccinated persons are at lower risk and** may travel taking public health precautions: If asymptomatic, no quarantine or testing is needed upon return; All non-essential travelers who **are not fully vaccinated** must: Quarantine for 7 full days after travel **if they get tested and get a negative COVID-19 viral test** result from a specimen collected 3-5 days after their arrival, Quarantine for 10 full days after travel **if they did not get tested with a COVID-19 viral test** after their arrival; All travelers must: Self-monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days, and avoid being around people who are at increased risk for severe illness, Isolate and should get tested if symptoms develop.
- April 2, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19 Order, which is effective at 12:01 a.m. on April 5, 2021 and includes the following modifications: **Breweries, Wineries, Distilleries that do not serve meals** can remain open outdoors and can also open indoors at 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is fewer. These establishments will follow the same public health directives as bars for their outdoor areas, however, there are additional requirements for indoor spaces: reservations are required for indoor seating, there is a maximum of 6 people per table and they must be from the same household, and there is no live entertainment or television viewing indoors; **Restaurants** can increase capacity for indoor dining to 50% capacity or 200 people, whichever is less with continued safety modifications; **Cardrooms** can operate indoors at 25% capacity. 75%, although Public Health strongly recommends grocery stores remain at 50% capacity until April 15 to allow as many grocery store workers as possible get vaccinated; **Hair Salons, Barbershops and Personal Care Services** can increase capacity to 75% with masks required, except for services where customers need to remove their masks. For services where customers must remove their face coverings, staff must wear a fitted N95 and goggles or a mask with a face shield; **Museums, Zoos and Aquariums** can be open indoors at 50% capacity; and **Youth and Adult Recreational Sports** can apply to Public Health for approval for athletic events, tournaments or competitions that involve more than two teams or multiple individuals.

- March 19, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19 Order, which is effective at 12:01 a.m. on March 20, 2021 and includes the following modifications: **Breweries, Distilleries, and Wineries** may reopen for outdoor only if not serving a bona fide meal; Added specific protocol for Limited Services, Appendix W, for business that generally do not require close contact; Increased the number of participants obtaining in-person behavioral health or substance use disorder support in therapeutic small group meetings and obtaining in-person faith-based small group counselling services, where the service cannot reasonably be practiced remotely, to 12 people or fewer.
- March 16, 2021 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until May 31, 2021, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- March 12, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19 Order, which is effective at 12:01 a.m. on March 15, 2021 and includes the following modifications: **Gyms, Fitness Centers, Yoga and Dance Studios** can open indoors at 10% capacity with masking requirements for all indoor activities; **Movie Theatres** can open indoors at 25% capacity with reserved seating only where each group is seated at least 6 feet of distance in all directions between any other groups; **Retail and Personal Care Services** can increase capacity to 50% with masking required at all times and for all services; **Restaurants** can open indoors at 25% max capacity under the following conditions: 8 feet distancing between tables; one household per table with a limit of 6 people; the HVAC system is in good working order and has been evaluated, and to the maximum extent possible ventilation has been increased. Public Health strongly recommends that all restaurant employees interacting with customers indoors are provided with additional masking protection (above the currently required face shield over face masks); this can be fit tested N95 masks, KN95 masks, or double masks and a face shield. In addition, Public Health strongly recommends that all employees working indoors are informed about and offered opportunities to be vaccinated. Outdoor dining can accommodate up to six people per table from 3 different households; **Indoor Shopping Malls** can increase capacity to 50% with common areas remaining closed; food courts can open at 25% capacity adhering to the restaurant guidance for indoor dining; **Institutes of Higher Education** can re-open all permitted activities with required safety modifications except for residential housing which remains under current restrictions for the Spring semester; **Schools** are permitted to re-open for in-person instruction for students in grades 7-12 adhering to all state and county directives; and **Private gatherings** can occur indoors with up to 3 separate households, with masking and distancing required at all times. People who are fully vaccinated can gather in small numbers indoors with other people who are fully vaccinated without required masking and distancing.
- March 10, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19 Order to include the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Interim Public Health Guidance for fully vaccinated people and visits or small private gatherings.
- February 18, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Reopening Safer at Work and in The Community for Control of COVID-19 Order to allow schools to reopen for in-person instruction for students in grades TK-6, if all State and County requirements are met.
- February 10, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued the Reopening Safer at Work and in The Community for Control of COVID-19 Order to allow Place of Worship to open for indoor services limited to 25% of indoor capacity and must continue to comply with the required modifications.

- January 29, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued the Reopening Safer at Work and in The Community for Control of COVID-19 Order to do the following: Limit outdoor occupancy at gyms, fitness facilities and museums to 50% of outdoor occupancy; Allow satellite wagering facilities and racetrack onsite wagering facilities to open for outdoor operations; Allow stand-alone grocery stores to operate at 35% capacity; Allow outdoor dining at restaurants, wineries, and breweries; Allow hotels, motels, shared rental units and similar facilities to reopen for tourism and individual travel; and Remove the operating hour restrictions for non-essential businesses.
- January 25, 2021 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued the Reopening Safer at Work and in The Community for Control of COVID-19 Order, which reinstates the November 25, 2020, County Health Order is now in effect. A new Health Officer Order will be issued by January 29, 2021, and will allow restaurants to open for outdoor dining.
- January 25, 2021 – Governor Newsom lifted the Regional Stay at Home Order for all Regions in the State.
- January 5, 2021 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until March 31, 2021, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- December 30, 2020 - The Los Angeles County Health Officer modified the Revised Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Updated Response to do the following: Persons arriving in the County of Los Angeles from anywhere outside of the Southern California Region (i.e., Imperial, Inyo, Los Angeles, Mono, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties) on or from non-essential travel, including returning County of Los Angeles residents, must self-quarantine for 10 days after arrival.
- December 29, 2020 – The State’s Regional Stay at Home Order for the Southern California Region has been extended until the Region’s ICU capacity projected out four weeks is above or equal to 15%.
- December 27, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer modified the Revised Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Updated Response to align with the end date of the State Public Health Officer’s Regional Stay at Home Order. The County HOO will remain in effect for as long as the State Public Health Officer’s Regional Stay at Home remains in effect in the Southern California Region.
- December 19, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer modified the Revised Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Updated Response to allow: Indoor and outdoor faith-based services, while following County Protocols for Places of Worship.
- December 17, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer modified the Blanket Isolation and Quarantine Orders. The Orders reduce the number of days in quarantine from 14 days to 10 days.
- December 9, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer modified the Revised Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Updated Response to allow: Outdoor playgrounds to remain open; and Stand-alone grocery stores to operate at 35% capacity.
- December 7, 2020 – The City Manager modified his directive to have all city employees, except essential field staff, work from home. The estimated return date of December 22, 2020 has been rescinded and all employees are directed to work from home until further notice. Office Staff – May report to work if necessary, with approval of their supervisor, and per the staggered work schedule. Field Staff – Reporting to work on their regular work days, but leaving as soon as essential / emergency work is completed.
- December 6, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued the Revised Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Updated Response. This Order aligns with the State’s Regional Stay at Home Order and is effective from 11:59 p.m. on December 6, 2020 to at least 11:59 p.m. on December 27, 2020 and includes the following modifications:
 - Closed businesses, recreational sites, commercial properties, and activities: Family entertainment centers for all activities, including but not limited to, miniature golf, go-karts and batting cages;

Indoor and outdoor playgrounds; Museums, zoos and aquariums; Personal care services, including but not limited to, hair salons and barbershops.

- Open or allowed with modifications: **All retailers** may operate indoors at **no more than 20% capacity** and must follow the applicable guidance for retailers. All access to retail must be strictly metered to ensure compliance with the limit on capacity. The sale of food, beverages, and alcohol for in-store consumption is prohibited; Outdoor recreation facilities may continue to operate. Those facilities may not sell food or drink for on-site consumption. Overnight stays at campgrounds are not permitted; Except as otherwise required by law, no hotel or lodging entity in California shall accept or honor out of state reservations for non-essential travel, unless the reservation is for at least the minimum time period required for quarantine and the persons identified in the reservation will quarantine in the hotel or lodging entity until after that time period has expired; Restaurants are open for take-out, drive thru, and delivery. There is no on-site dining; Drive-In Movie Theaters/Drive-In Events are recommended to close. Those that remain open must adhere to County Public Health Drive-In Movie Protocol; Vehicle-Based Parades, whenever possible, should be cancelled for the duration of this Order. Only persons from the same household may occupy a vehicle. Vehicle-Based Parades must comply with County Public Health Vehicle-Based Parade Protocol.
- December 3, 2020 – Governor Newsom issued a Regional Stay at Home Order, which will be implemented when ICU bed capacity in the Southern California Region is less than 15%. The Order will go into effect within 24 hours once ICU bed capacity is less than 15% and will be in effect for three weeks.
 - In any region that triggers a Regional Stay Home Order because it drops below 15% ICU capacity, the following sectors must close: Indoor and outdoor playgrounds; Indoor recreational facilities; Hair salons and barbershops; Personal care services; Museums, zoos, and aquariums; Movie theaters; Wineries; Bars, breweries, and distilleries; Family entertainment centers; Cardrooms and satellite wagering; Limited services; Live audience sports; Amusement parks.
 - The following sectors will have additional modifications in addition to 100% masking and physical distancing: **Outdoor recreational facilities:** Allow outdoor operation only without any food, drink or alcohol sales. Additionally, overnight stays at campgrounds will not be permitted; **Retail:** Allow indoor operation at 20% capacity with entrance metering and no eating or drinking in the stores. Additionally, special hours should be instituted for seniors and others with chronic conditions or compromised immune systems; **Shopping centers:** Allow indoor operation at 20% capacity with entrance metering and no eating or drinking in the stores. Additionally, special hours should be instituted for seniors and others with chronic conditions or compromised immune systems; **Hotels and lodging:** Allow to open for critical infrastructure support only; **Restaurants:** Allow only for take-out, pick-up, or delivery; **Offices:** Allow remote only except for critical infrastructure sectors where remote working is not possible; **Places of worship and political expression:** Allow outdoor services only; **Entertainment production including professional sports:** Allow operation without live audiences. Additionally, testing protocol and “bubbles” are highly encouraged.
 - The following sectors are allowed to remain open when a remote option is not possible with appropriate infectious disease preventative measures including 100% masking and physical distancing: Critical infrastructure; Schools; Non-urgent medical and dental care; Child care and pre-K.
- November 28, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued the Temporary Targeted Safer at Home Health Officer Order for Control of COVID-19: Tier 1 Substantial Surge Response. The Order is effective November 30 – December 20, 2020 and includes the following modifications:
 - All public and private gatherings with individuals not in your household are prohibited, except for church services and protests, which are constitutionally protected rights.
 - Occupancy limits at various businesses; all individuals at these sites are required to wear **face coverings and keep at least 6 feet of distance:** Essential retail – 35% maximum occupancy Non-essential retail (includes indoor malls) – 20% maximum occupancy; Personal care services – 20% maximum occupancy; Libraries – 20% maximum occupancy; Fitness centers operating outdoors – 50% maximum occupancy; Museums galleries, zoos, aquariums, botanical gardens

operating outdoors – 50% maximum occupancy; Mini-golf, batting cages, go-kart racing operating outdoors – 50% maximum occupancy.

- Outdoor recreation activities all which **require face coverings (except for swimming) and distancing**; Beaches, trails, and parks remain open; gatherings at these sites with members outside your household are prohibited; Golf courses, tennis courts, pickleball, archery ranges, skate parks, bike parks, and community gardens remain open for individuals or members of a single household. Pools that serve more than one household may open only for regulated lap swimming with one person per lane; Drive-in movies/events/car parades are permitted provided occupants in each car are members of one household.
 - All schools and day camps remain open adhering to re-opening protocols. K-12 Schools and Day Camps with an outbreak (3 cases or more over 14 days) should close for 14 days.
 - Closed non-essential businesses/activities; Playgrounds (with the exception of playgrounds at childcare and schools); Cardrooms.
- November 25, 2020 - The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to do the following: Align the County Order with the State Public Health Officer's November 19, 2020 Limited Stay at Home Order; and Require restaurants, breweries and wineries to only offer food and beverage via take-out, drive-thru or delivery. Wineries and breweries may continue their retail operations. These limitation are effective November 25 through December 17, 2020.
 - November 24, 2020, – The City Manager ordered all city employees to work from home until December 21, 2020. Office Staff – May report to work if necessary, with approval of their supervisor, and per the staggered work schedule. Field Staff – Reporting to work on their regular work days, but leaving as soon as essential work (work orders and scheduled maintenance) is completed. City Hall is closed to the public until December 21, 2020.
 - November 19, 2020 - The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to do the following: Limit the number of persons at private outdoor gatherings to 15 persons, all from a maximum of three different households; Limit number of customers at outdoor restaurants, breweries, and wineries to 50% of the establishment's outdoor capacity. Restaurants, breweries and wineries may not open for in-person outdoor dining and wine services, between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., but may continue to serve food for delivery, drive-thru, and carry out, during the time closed for in-person dining; Limit the number of customers at outdoor Cardrooms, Miniature Golf, Batting Cages, and Go Cart Racing to 50% of the establishment's outdoor capacity; Limit the number of persons at indoor operations for retail, office, and personal care to 25% capacity. Require face coverings to be worn by customers at all times while at Personal Care Establishments; Clarify that an essential business must comply with the Social (Physical) Distancing Protocol and all other applicable protocols for its business sector; Specify the type of retail food markets that must comply with the new Protocols for Grocery Stores and Retail Food Markets.
 - November 4, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until January 31, 2021, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
 - October 23, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to: Permit batting cages, miniature golf and go cart racing to operate outside only. Arcades and other indoor family entertainment operations remain closed; Permit personal care establishments to offer services indoors with modifications; Clarify permitted food services at Indoor Malls and Shopping Centers; Increase the percentage of students with IEPs and ELs, and other high need students allowed at any one time ton a K-12 campus from 10% to 25%; Permit schools to reopen TK-2nd Grades for classroom instruction only with a waiver application approved by LACoDPH.
 - October 14, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow: Private gatherings of persons from no more than 3 households. Private gatherings must be held outside and should be limited to two hours or less. Attendees must follow physical distancing and hand hygiene protocols.

- October 6, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow: Outdoor dining at Non-Restaurant breweries and wineries with conditions and modifications.
- October 5, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow: Cardrooms to reopen for outdoor operations only with required modifications; and on October 7, Indoor malls and shopping centers to open at a maximum of 25% indoor capacity with required modifications.
- October 2, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow: Nail salons to reopen indoor operations at 25% capacity with modifications; and to remove the restriction on the reopening outdoor children’s playgrounds. Playgrounds may reopen at the discretion of the local authority that operates the outdoor playground.
- September 15, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until November 30, 2020, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- September 2, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow: Schools K-12 to offer services for students most in need of in-person learning; and Hair salons and barbershops to offer indoor services with limited occupancy.
- August 12, 2020 - The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to: Clarify when elementary schools (TK-6) may seek a waiver to conduct in-person instruction; Update operations for childcare facilities; and Align with new guidance for Institutes of Higher Education.
- July 21, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until September 30, 2020, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- July 18, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order, requiring schools in Los Angeles County to conduct distance learning only.
- July 14, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order, requiring the closure of indoor operations for the following sectors: Gyms and Fitness Centers; Places of Worship; Indoor Protests; Offices for Non-Critical Infrastructure Sectors as identified at covid19.ca.gov.; Personal Care Services (including nail salons, massage parlors, and tattoo parlors); Hair Salons and Barbershops; Indoor Malls
- July 1, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order, requiring the following: Restaurants are closed for indoor dining; Indoor areas of museums, zoos and aquariums are closed; Card rooms and satellite wagering facilities are closed; Staff and patrons of gyms must wear cloth face coverings and gloves.
- June 29, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until August 10, 2020, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are only paid for actual hours worked.
- June 28, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order, requiring all Bars, Wineries, Breweries and Tasting Rooms to close.
- June 18, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to modify the requirements for cloth face coverings and to allow the following sectors/services to open with modified operations to comply with guidance provided by LACoDPH: Cardrooms, Satellite wagering facilities and Racetracks with no spectators; Personal care services including: Esthetician, skin care and cosmetology services; Electrology; Nail salons; Body art professionals; Tattoo parlors, microblading and permanent make-up; Tanning salons; Piercing shops; and Massage therapy; Bars, Wineries, Breweries and Tasting Rooms.
- June 11, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Work and in The Community Order to allow the following sectors/services to open with modified operations to comply with guidance provided by LACoDPH: Gyms and fitness facilities; Pro-league arenas without live audiences; Day camps; Museums, galleries, zoos and aquariums; Campgrounds, RV parks and outdoor recreation; Music, film and television production; Hotels for leisure travel.

- May 29, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Home Order to allow the following services to open with modified operations to comply with guidance provided by LACoDPH: In-Person Dining in Restaurants; Barber Shops and Hair Salons.
- May 26, 2020 - The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until June 30, 2020, except employees performing essential tasks or functions. Senior Recreation Leaders and Recreation Leaders are on paid administrative leave until June 19, 2020.
- May 26, 2020 - The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Home Order (HOO) to allow the following to open with modified operations to comply with guidance provided by LACoDPH: Faith-Based Organizations; Indoor and Outdoor Retail Shopping Centers; Flea Markets, Swap Meets and Drive-In Theaters; Pools, Hot Tubs and Saunas in a multi-unit residence or part of a homeowners association.
- May 22, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Home Order, moving the County into Stage 2 of the County’s Roadmap to Recovery.
- May 13, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised and extended the Safer at Home Order. The order is effective immediately and will continue until further notice.
- May 8, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised the Safer at Home Order to allow for the conditional and limited reopening of certain lower-risk retail business, golf courses, and public spaces.
- May 5, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until May 31, 2020, except employees performing essential tasks or functions.
- April 21, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until May 15, 2020.
- April 21, 2020 – The City Council adopted Resolution No. 5465 extending the proclamation of the existence of a local emergency.
- April 10, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer revised and extended the Safer at Home Order until May 15, 2020.
- March 31, 2020 – The City Council extended paid administrative leave for all city employees until May 1, 2020.
- March 20, 2020 – The City Manager ordered all city employees to work from home and provided paid administrative leave for all city employees until April 2, 2020.
- March 19, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer issued Safer at Home Order for the Control of COVID-19, until April 19, 2020.
- March 13, 2020 – The City Council adopted Resolution No. 5457 proclaiming the existence of a local emergency.
- March 13, 2020 – President Trump declared a national state of emergency.
- March 12, 2020 – Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-25-20.
- March 4, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors proclaimed the existence of a local emergency in Los Angeles County.
- March 4, 2020 – The Los Angeles County Health Officer declared a local health emergency.
